3rd Covelo Road defendant pleas to

19 years

With his jury trial just around the corner, the third and final defendant who jointly planned with others and was personally involved in the 2020 Covelo Road armed robberies and kidnappings of two cannabis money runners, as well as the armed robbery of a separate motorist, tapped out Wednesday afternoon, September 6 in the Mendocino County Superior Court.

Defendant Jesus Estevan Vargas, Jr., age 44, of Moreno Valley, chose to forego a trial by jury and, instead, accepted the District Attorney's last and final plea/ sentence "bargain" mandating that the defendant serve 19 years in state prison.

To that end, defendant Jesus Vargas entered no contest plea Wednesday afternoon to his participation, along with two co-conspirators, in the kidnapping of the cannabis money courier and his driver, said crime occurring on September 27, 2020.

How long does one live with an unsolved problem that is not being solved, even though all parties are Does Caltrans have too much money to spend? aware of it?

Around 2016, it was noticed that the water bill at 22751 Bray Road, known as Adventist Christian School of Willits, was increasing significantly. We took steps to see what the problem might be, locking down outside faucets, installing video cameras, looking for leaks, doing pressure checks inside and outside the building and property. The plumber and others concluded that the leak was not on the campus.

In contacting the owner of the company that installed the line just a few years before, Wipf Construction, we were told that it was a bored line 10-15 underground and that there could be no leak there. We contacted the City of Willits Department of Water and asked if they could check the meter, because when the water was turned off on the school side, the meter continued to turn. However, when the meter is turned off on the city side, the meter stopped running. We have had a number of visits with the meter guys over the last seven years and they see that it is turning, but they have said it cannot be the meter, that it must be the line. We asked that the meter be checked. Last month, we were told to dig up the line from the meter to where it met the bored line because the leak



antique steam-driven devices that were instrumental in building Mendocino County. The event was the annual Steam Fest, a celebration of the noisy, powerful machines that enabled the logging industry

to efficiently process and transport their products to buyers. The free train rides around the near onemile loop encircled the soccer and baseball fields, on which families had a choice of two open-air cars or the ever-popular caboose, allowing a small group to ride up high in the

The ride gave them a glimpse into the past world where steam-driven railroads afforded passengers the opportunity to travel long distances or to transport goods many miles to their intended destinations.

In addition to the train rides. Roots started up and operated several of the other pieces of historical steam devices, such as the Bucyrus-Erie steamroller, the massive steam shovel, a Keystone driller, and several steam donkeys (mostly stationary machines to aid in moving materials up and down mountains).

Across East Commercial Street, at Recreation Grove Park, the annual Members Appreciation Barbecue took place on Saturday afternoon, feeding over 400 people, mostly dues-paying members

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"[We're serving] barbecue tri tip," said Valerie Smith, the barbecue chairperson. "Andrew Hosford, Jack Drew, Jeff Yokum and Stan Cooley are the barbecue guys. We have Chris Baldo's famous tomato salad. 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





Common Collectibles & Gaming Lounge is an arcade, gamer store, and party locale all in one fun, new establishment

When does a hobby become a business? For the three partners of the new Common Collectibles & Gaming Lounge at 393 South Main Street Suite A, it is difficult

Mathew Caine to pin down when they went pro. These lifelong gaming enthusiasts have

spent a good portion of their lives playing, testing, trading, selling and loving the worlds which these video-enhanced diversions provide to the fertile imaginations of both young and old

Video games have been around since 1958 when scientists at the Brookhaven National Laboratory developed a tennis game played on an oscilloscope, a game not available to the public. In 1972, Atari released Pong, the first commercially available video game and the industry has grown to a multi-billion-dollar industry rivaling the cinema for entertainment, dollars and players.

Zach Shabert, Dakota Blunt and Michael Overholt opened Common Collectibles a few weeks ago to little fanfare but with a growing group of gaming and collectibles enthusiasts who rent access to the arcade games by the half or full hour. Many of the games are archival retro, with familiar titles like Donkey Kong or Space Invaders. There is a room with a twoplayer laser shoot-'em-up and an intricate threescreen sophisticated racing game, complete with multiple cars, tracks and specifications.

"The Game Lounge in the back has some PSIs, some Xs, some of the newer stuff," explained Shabert. "We also have some arcade machines, some retro boxes, and a room that is dedicated to light gun games, like Duck Hunt, Time Crisis. We also have a race sim, here on the corner. It's a realistic racing game."

In addition to video games. Common Collectibles also has a large selection of vintage comics and other tradable items. "We have the collectible area here. We have a lot of Funco Pops, which are pop-culture references like Bobble Heads and figurines, from everything from movies to music to video games. We have comics. Pokémon cards.

"We even have some older stuff on the back shelf, Star Trek figurines from the mid-to-early '90s. We try to grab as much variety as we can. People come in that might have something from their childhood that they were into," said Shabert.

They are also available for parties. "We do birthdays and other kid events," Shabert explained. "We rent out the tables and the birthday-kid gets game-time for free. We rent them in two-hour blocks. We're open Wednesday through Friday and the two-hour blocks are from 2 to 4 pm and 4 to 6pm on those days. And Saturdays and Sundays, we're open noon to 10 pm and the two-hour blocks are from noon to 2 pm, 2 to 4 pm, and 4 to 6 pm.

The prices to play on the machines are reasonable when compared to coin-operated arcades. "One half hour for the Game Lounge is \$6, one hour for \$10. The racing simulator is \$9 for a half hour and \$16 for an hour," said

"The reason the racing sim is more expensive is that it is much more technically advanced than all the games in the back," he explained. "There is an age limit on the racing sim. We try to keep it at 14 years old. The racing sim has a lot of force feedback on the steering wheel."

In the works, the store is planning to have gaming tournaments. "We plan on doing some video game tournaments," said Shabert. "We

might do something called 'Super Smash Saturdays' where we play Super Smash Brothers. We're going to do duos – two versus twos, and singles – one versus ones. We plan to do the grand prize as a WWE-style title belt.

"Super Smash Brothers is a Nintendo Switch game that started in Nintendo 64. All of the Nintendo characters that they have rights to are put into a fighting game. You can have people like Link from Zelda fighting Super Mario, or you can have Pikachu from Pokémon fighting Fox from Star Fox. It's a really, really cool game. I like it a lot," Shabert said enthusiastically

In addition, they plan a weekly high-game contest with a rotating set of video games.

"We created this place as a safe space for kids to come and have fun. We know there's not a lot in town that specifically caters to kids. There's a little bit of everything for everybody here, adults as well, a lot of retro games for those who like nostalgia and being able to play their favorite games from childhood. We have a pretty massive selection of games so adults might be able to play some of the games they may have missed that they always wanted to play," said Shabert.

Huffman, "A lot of politics." He explained, "A group of hardliners insisted on concessions with every round of voting. By the end, there were a lot of concessions made. The Rules Committee. which controls the floor agenda and what comes to a vote, now includes the most intense and extreme elements of speaker McCarthy's party."

This was all to say that Huffman and the rest of the Democratic Party in Congress are having a difficult time moving bills forward. The fiscal year for the federal government begins October 1. There are 12 different appropriations bills, generally passed annually, that provide budgets for various government agencies to operate. Huffman says even these basic bills aren't being passed, which will likely mean another government shutdown.

Much of the meeting was spent discussing what Huffman described as his highest priority, climate change, and the catastrophic effects it's having on California as a whole, and the 2nd District more specifically. Many folks in the meeting had much to say about their own harrowing experiences with recent

With fire on the tip of everyone's mind, and as California transitions more and more to cleaner sources of energy, a question was raised about how an already taxed and antiquated grid power system would be able to handle the additional loads coming from the push for greener energy.

Huffman talked about aggressively pursuing major upgrades with transmission lines. He said a good deal of federal money is in place from the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act to support major transmission line upgrades, and that it's a matter of getting the various authorities, who involved with managing and maintaining our grid power system, comfortable with the idea of overbuilding the grid so that it's able to handle a huge increase in capacity.

He also spoke about how PGE is undergrounding many of its high-voltage lines (though he said not nearly enough). He elaborated: "We've still got a long way to go when it comes to the adequacy and the safety of PGE's part of this grid. We're functionally in an energy moratorium in parts of my district where PGE is not allowing new hookups because, frankly, they're spending all their money out there trying to upgrade the most vulnerable parts of their system so that they don't spark fires every time the wind blows. We've got to push them to do more and to do it faster."

The issue of homeowner's insurance when fires do come through the area was another big topic. One woman shared that her home policy with AAA has gone up to over \$15,000. Huffman sympathized and said this is something he hears about a lot. Some new buyers in California may not be able to get policies at all. He told the group, "The challenge at the federal level is that insurance is typically regulated and controlled state by state, so there's very little at the federal level to effect insurance markets." Because there are so many natural disasters on such a grand scale due to climate change, Huffman said, FEMA is not the answer.

He continued, "Starting at the state level, trying to get the insurance commissioner and the state legislature to hold these carriers accountable and make them charge reasonable rates could be a way to go." The backstops to insurance providers, massive companies like Swiss Reinsurance, think California is too high a risk. Huffman said he doesn't know what the exact answer is, short of some massive government intervention, which he said would be a tough sell politically and otherwise

Furthering the climate change discussion, Huffman went into detail on bills like the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act and the Inflation Reduction Act that have guite a number of green energy provisions in them. He made it seem that for every two steps forward toward cleaner energy, there were two steps back. An example he gave was West Virginia Senator Joe Manchin's role in requiring yearly fossil fuel leases both on and offshore, in exchange for the development of offshore wind and onshore solar and geothermal renewables on public land.

Representative Huffman explained, "If we're listening to the science, this transition to clean energy has to mean we wind down fossil fuel business as usual, but Joe Manchin locked a lot of that in. In the Investment and Jobs Act we included about \$8 billion for a national electric vehicle charging network, and there's even more in the Inflation Reduction Act, but there was almost three times that much for a new LNG [liquefied natural gas] facility in Alaska."

big one in Humboldt County right now, and

one Huffman enthusiastically supports. An excerpt from his website reads: "The offshore wind proposal, driven by the Biden and Newsom administration efforts to dramatically increase renewable energy. would erect dozens of turbines, with blades as long as a football field in an area of the Pacific Ocean nearly 10 times the size of Manhattan. The turbines, which would be about 20 miles from shore in water up to 2,500 feet deep, are a key part of the state's plan to generate enough offshore wind energy to power more than 20 million

Roe v. Wade was another significant topic Huffman was asked about. He said a bill to codify Roe would have made it to the president's desk except for the Senate filibuster. The filibuster rule itself is a hot button issue these days. Huffman described it as "antidemocratic." He said it comes to us from the days of Jim Crow when they were desperately afraid of too much civil rights legislation making it through the senate, so they created this super-high, super-majority

Because of the filibuster rule, it's no longer, and hasn't been for quite some time, a simple matter of majority rule (51 votes to pass a bill after debate has ended). The filibuster, and its supermajority requirement means that it takes 60 votes to end the debate over a bill so that it's able to be voted on at all. Huffman and most Democrats would like to see the filibuster done away with.

Brief discussions on nuclear technology, immigration, and student loan forgiveness concluded the event. It's very unlikely that we'll see any new nuclear energy infrastructure in California, Huffman said. There's a current moratorium on it, and Huffman thinks nuclear waste is still too big a safety issue and one that nobody really wants to deal with. He's also hopeful that advancements in battery storage will handle a lot of our base power requirements in the

In regard to immigration, Huffman says the federal government is further away from comprehensive immigration reform today than in his previous years. An earned pathway to citizenship, visa reform, and border security were all on the table when he first came to Congress, but in subsequent years, it's completely blown up. He said he is tentatively hopeful that some kind of reform for immigrant children who have been in the U.S. for most of their lives can be achieved.

He touched on the fact that our ports of entry are very unsecure, which opens us up to bigger issues like cartels moving fentanyl across the border and furthering the synthetic opioid pandemic, but he believes building a wall will do nothing to keep these problems out of the United States.

And If you're one of the many people looking forward to some kind of student loan forgiveness, Huffman says they're basically not able to legislate a solution. President Biden's plan is to keep trying to use any authority he has to bring any kind of relief possible. With a different Senate and a different House and no filibuster. Huffman does think student loan forgiveness is

The meeting wrapped with most people seeming satisfied with the answers they were given. Huffman's field representative for Mendocino County, Jez Anderson, passed out her contact and gathered notes and letters community members brought for representative Huffman to look into further, which he promised to do.

Sheriff Kendall ended his remarks

Having surreptitiously placed electronic tracker in Southern California on the courier's vehicle, the three crooks - dressed to look like law enforcement agents, masked, armed for what appeared to be a war, and driving a vehicle outfitted to look like a law enforcement vehicle tracked their target as it traveled from the Los Angeles area towards Covelo, initiating what would have appeared to any driver on the road that day to be a law enforcement pull-over of the courier vehicle and second vehicle on Covelo

The financial target of the crooks was the almost \$700,000 secreted away in a hidden compartment in the courier vehicle – a stash of money and a hidden compartment known to defendant Jesus Vargas from when he used to be the illegal cannabis money runner until he was fired and replaced.

Defendant Jesus Vargas also pled no contest Wednesday afternoon to having committed a separate armed robbery of an uninvolved motorist who also had pulled over when he saw the flashing lights on the faux police vehicle

Finally, defendant Jesus Vargas admitted a special sentencing enhancement charged by the District Attorney that during the robbery and kidnappings he was armed with a firearm.

Because kidnapping and robbery have been characterized as violent felonies by the California Legislature, defendant Jesus Vargas now stands convicted of two strikes, within the meaning of California's current version of "Three Strikes."

Again, because kidnapping and robbery are characterized by law to be violent felonies, the early release credits defendant Jesus Vargas may attempt to earn in state prison should be capped by prison authorities at no more than 15 and their crime associate, Roy Ha.

Because he had procrastinated in resolving his case, defendant Jesus Vargas was also required by the prosecutor to waive a full year of actual jail custody time credits in order to be able to resolve the matter, making the defendant's overall sentence equal to a state prison commitment of just over 20

The defendant's case was referred to Department, as required by law, so prison sentence

Adult Probation may gather background information on the defendant that will be used by the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation in their intake, classification, and prison facility assignment responsibilities.

The law enforcement agencies that gathered the evidence supporting the defendant's convictions were the Mendocino County Sheriff's Office, the California Highway Patrol, Cal Fire, the Las Vegas Police Department, the Federal Bureau of Investigations, various law enforcement agencies in Southern California, and the District Attorney's own Bureau of Investigations.

Special note is made of Cal Fire's nvolvement in this case. As the crooks were preparing their getaway after having pulled over the two vehicles, hooded the money runners at gunpoint, restrained them with zip ties in the back seat of the fake law enforcement vehicle, zip-tied the uninvolved driver on the ground and stole his keys and cell phone, and inserted defendant Jesus Vargas as driver of the money vehicle, Cal Fire fire crew vehicles traveling from Covelo came upon and witnessed what they considered to be a very suspicious situation happening at the turn-out not far from Highway 101.

The trailing Cal Fire vehicle stopped and freed the uninvolved motorist. received a quick summary of what that victim said had happened, and called in the crimes to the Sheriff's Office, which allowed sheriff's deputies to eventually locate the two vehicles on Highway 20 as the crooks were trying to go out through Lake County.

Mendocino County DA David Eyster has been directing the prosecution of defendant Jesus Vargas, as well as the defendant's brother, Nathan John Vargas,

Defendant Ha was sentenced on June 7, 2023 to 30 years in state prison. Defendant Nathan Vargas was sentenced on June 23, 2023 to 25 years in state

Mendocino County Superior Court Victoria Shanahan accepted defendant Jesus Vargas' no contest pleas and enhancement Wednesday afternoon. The defendant will return to court in late September to the Mendocino County Adult Probation be formally sentenced to the stipulated
