Preschool students visit Little Lake Fire Department to learn about fire safety and check out the trucks

Field trip day is always a fun day, and when that field trip includes big red fire engines, well, it's even better.

On Wednesday morning, students of Imagination Station Preschool and Daycare Center were able to have just that kind of fun, as they walked over from their nearby school to the Little Lake Firehouse.

Two groups of students came, the older ones first, then a second presentation to the younger bunch after. Both presentations aimed to familiarize the students with seeing firefighters and police officers, with and without safety gear, lights and special equipment, to make sure that, if the need arises, kids aren't scared of the law enforcement or emergency personnel.

understanding of how children can contribute to keep themselves safe," explained Imagination Station Preschool and Daycare Center's owner, Saprina Rodriguez. "This can help children overcome fears relating to the gear firemen use or the uniform they wear, and allowing children to ask questions or shake a firefighter's hand can alleviate stress and build positive thoughts."

Meeting the kids is always fun for the emergency personnel, too, seeing the excitement when they receive special stickers and hats and get to see the trucks up close.

CAL FIRE Mendocino Unit lifts burn ban

The Department of Forestry and Fire Protection, Mendocino Unit is lifting the suspension of residential outdoor burn permits. This suspension was lifted on Wednesday, October 11, 2023, at 12:01 am

CAL FIRE Mendocino Unit Chief Luke Kendall is formally cancelling the burn permit suspension and advises that those possessing current and valid agriculture and residential burn permits can now resume burning on permissible burn days. Agriculture burns must be inspected by CAL FIRE prior to burning until the end of the peak fire season.

Inspections may be required for burns other than agriculture burns.

Burn permits are available online from CAL FIRE at https://burnpermit.fire.ca.gov/.

IMPORTANT: CAL FIRE burn permits are only for residents who live in the State Responsibility Area, or where CAL FIRE has jurisdictional authority. It is the responsibility of the landowner to check with

State cannabis task force releases Q3 report

Submitted by Department of Cannabis Control

Continuing to protect public safety, safeguard natural resources, and advance the integrity of the legal cannabis market, the Unified Cannabis Enforcement Taskforce seized more than \$101 million in illegal cannabis during the third quarter of 2023. During enforcement operations, UCETF seized 69 crime-linked firearms — a 363% increase compared to the previous

Among the highlights from the third quarter were seizures of almost 100,000 cannabis plants and over 61,000 pounds of illegal cannabis. These numbers were accomplished despite serving 35 percent fewer search warrants in the quarter.

"For the last three months UCETF has been focused on larger, outdoor cannabis operations that posed a significant threat to the environment and public safety," stated Bill Jones, chief of the Law Enforcement Division for Department of Cannabis Control.

"Many of these illegal cannabis operations are linked to organized crime, and in addition to threatening the environment and communities, the products these operations pose a direct threat to consumer health and the stability of the legal cannabis market."

The results of UCETF's Q3 2023 enforcement actions are listed below:

In the third quarter 2023, UCETF served 60 search warrants, and seized 61,415.75 pounds of cannabis,

with a retail value of \$101,349,657. The task force eradicated 98,054 cannabis plants in the third quarter, and seized 69 firearms and \$0 in cash.

In comparison, in the second quarter 2023, UCETF served 92 search warrants, and seized 66,315.01 pounds of cannabis, with a retail value of \$109,277,688.94. The task force eradicated 120,970 cannabis plants, and seized 18 firearms and \$223,809 in cash

"Over the past quarter, UCTEF conducted several highly coordinated operations that will disrupt the illegal supply chain and improve consumer and public safety. The task force focused on rural areas where illegal cultivators have been conducting unlicensed operations," said Nathaniel Arnold, acting chief of Enforcement for the California Department of Fish and

"These enforcement numbers represent the hard work and commitment from our multiagency teams. I applaud our officers and partner agencies who worked tirelessly to identify these clandestine operations and provide a good measure of public and consumer safety."

Since inception, UCETF has seized \$295,284,220.94 in unlicensed cannabis through the serving of 203 search warrants. The taskforce has also eradicated 277,314 plants and seized 101 firearms.







The tournament rules included a "small blind" and a "big blind," a system by which players in certain positions from the dealers ante in ever-increasing amounts to create a pot of money and make the game more exciting and to spur

Every 20 minutes, the blind amounts would increase per a lighted sign which counted off the minutes and stated the amount of the blinds. The four tables of competitors each had a dealer (Jack Drew, Chris Folsom, Brian Agenbroad and Alyssa Taylor) who would move the game along and

ensure that the cards were dealt correctly.

As the game continued, players began to go broke until the tables were consolidated and the last player took home that portion (30 percent) of the entry and rebuy fees, the remainder going to the Grapplin' Pack.

In addition to the entry fees and the rebuys, players could buy into the "high hand" competition with an additional \$10, which could be won with the highest hand over a full house. The winner of this contest would get to split the pot

There was also a small silent auction with some very attractive prizes. A redwood picnic table was provided by Willits Redwood. A custom blanket, sewn by founding member Wayne Shull's mother, depicted the organization's name and logos. There was also a watercolor painting by Georgine Hultz, and an ocean fishing day, provided by





An annular solar eclipse happens when the moon is at or near its farthest point from Earth, NASA explains. "Because the moon is farther away than it is during a total solar eclipse, the moon appears smaller and doesn't block out the entire sun when it passes in front of our star. Instead, the moon leaves a bright ring of sun visible at the eclipse's peak, creating the 'ring of fire' effect."

Just as with any eclipse, viewers must never look at the sun directly, either using an indirect viewing method, or wearing certified solar-viewing glasses.

Gavin Newsom's Clean California initiative, which is a sweeping \$1.2 billion, multiyear commitment led by Caltrans to clean up trash, create thousands of jobs, and help communities beautify their public

With this week's announcement. Clean California grants have funded nearly 300 projects statewide to revitalize and beautify underserved communities, some of which are already complete and now sources of community pride. The projects will improve public spaces, tribal lands, parks, neighborhoods, transit centers, walking paths, streets, roadsides, recreation fields, community gathering spots, and places of cultural importance or historical interest in underserved communities.

The 42 Clean California local grants announced this week are in addition to the nearly \$300 million in grants Governor Newsom announced in March 2022 to more than 100 local Clean California

In District 1, serving Del Norte, Humboldt, Lake and Mendocino counties, seven projects were awarded approximately \$11.5 million in Clean CA grant funds in the first round. In this second round, four projects were awarded approximately \$15.3 million.

In addition to the "Beautify Willits" project, two other projects in Mendocino County were funded.

Approximately \$267,000 was awarded to the Fort Bragg Art and Recycling Beautification Project, which proposes to procure and install art-covered, eye-catching multi-use waste receptacles at strategically placed locations throughout town to reduce littering and increase recycling.... In addition, the city will host two Beach Clean-Up Events during the grants performance period.

Approximately \$4.7 million was awarded to the Anderson Valley Unified School District for their Anderson Valley Track to Health and Fitness, which will provide beautification, enhancement and expansive community fitness opportunities in Boonville. The track will be a venue for safe and equitable sporting events for highpoverty youth at Anderson Valley Junior Senior High School, accessible for independent soccer league participation, a location for fitness charity/tournament events, and most importantly a place for all residents to achieve their individual wellness and recreation goals, since there are no gyms or workout facilities within a 20-mile

Following the positive community response to the first round of grants, Governor Newsom and the state legislature approved \$100 million last year for a second round of local grant projects. The local grants awarded this week range from \$88,000 to \$5 million, and all benefit underserved communities. In addition, this week's funding announcement includes \$14.5 million to support 18 projects to clean up stations and other areas around public transit systems.

Since launching Clean California in July 2021, Caltrans and local partners have removed an estimated 1.86 million cubic yards of litter from state highways – a trash pile that would be more than 370 times taller than Mount Whitney (14,505 feet, the state's highest peak).

The program has created more than 4,000 jobs that have helped Californians overcome barriers to employment, including 357 people experiencing homelessness, and drawn more than 10,000 volunteers to events ranging from community cleanups to large debris collections for appliances, tires and mattresses.

As the Clean California effort moves forward, Caltrans and local communities will continue to draw attention to the negative impact litter has on natural resources, waterways, public safety, and public health to create a cultural shift of shared responsibility for clean and vibrant public spaces.

Caltrans is also developing a program in which communities throughout the state can earn a special Clean California Community designation by meeting criteria centered around preventing and cleaning up litter, promoting recycling and greening or beautifying neighborhoods. In exchange for being able to hold their practices at the school, the Willits Grapplin' Pack helps out with utilities and maintenance, especially during flood

"[The school] is in a floodplain so with the group that we have, when that flooding comes and it threatens the school, there's a big group of people who come down and help the church staff mitigate the risk of damage from the floods. We help do grounds keeping and facility improvement.

"We want to give back to them what they have given to us. Georgine Hultz is with the church and gives us a list of things that need to be done. We try and meet those needs," said Shull.

In the future, the Grapplin' Pack, according to Shull, would like to create tournaments with the Waldorf School (who has their own poker tournament at Sparetime) and other organizations.

"We're looking at possibly creating a series of tournaments with these other groups. We'd have the individual tournaments and the top people of each would compete at a championship tournament. That should help get the numbers up for each club. Maybe it would create some consistency with dealers, having the amount we need of experienced dealers," Shull

Pamela Lee, the Farm to School Network lead for Northern California, was the primary speaker, followed by a panel of local folks already participating the program. The panel included Mike Adams of Nurturing Seed Farm, Mike Foley, cofounder of the School of Adaptive Agriculture and president of the Mendocino County Farmers Market Association, Katie Lacy, Food Services director and Culinary Arts instructor for Willits Charter School, Aurelie Clivas, garden director, counselor, and student coordinator for Willits Charter School, and Sarah Marshall, Food Policy and Project manager for North Coast Opportunities.

Schools working in collaboration with local farms to feed their students isn't a recent phenomenon, but it's fallen out of favor over the years in exchange for prepackaged, reheatable options that require less staff and kitchen equipment in school cafeterias. Basically, it's cheaper for schools to not have to do a lot of sourcing, storage, and cooking. Last year California began paying for school breakfast and lunch for all children TK-12, regardless of income. In the past, to qualify for the free or reduced lunch program, a child's family had to fall under a certain percentage of the federal poverty line, which could carry a lot of stigma for the children receiving free or reduced lunch.

Now with the extra revenue coming in from the state. school districts are incentivized to begin rebuilding their kitchens and staff to provide more meals and healthier meals to a much larger number of kids. This is a good thing for small, local farmers in theory, though lots of these farms are badly in need of funding to update farm equipment, processing equipment, food storage space, and staff so that they can meet the needs of the schools that want to contract with them. Farmers also need to be paid a fair market price for their goods. Lee says this is where the CDFA grant money could come in very handy.

Mike Adams of Nurturing Seed has just recently started providing produce to Willits Charter School. He said of his experience so far: "For the last few weeks we've been able to connect with Katie and bring our produce to them, which has been pretty awesome and easy. To make it as a farmer, it's a lot of work. You're growing stuff and you need to know where it's going, which at some level slows down the whole planting process if you don't know what you're doing with what you're going to produce. We've made a lot of donations, but it's not a long-term sustainable business plan. The school has been great, and the idea of being able to expand our production, plan for sales, and know that there's an avenue for revenue coming in in the future. Some of the grants might provide opportunities for infrastructure improvement. This is what we've needed

Food hubs are one-way farms can better manage some of the logistic hurdles they face in increasing production. Our local Mendo Lake Food Hub connects small farms to buyers and also helps with some of the infrastructure and transportation issues smaller farms might have by providing space to store, box up, and distribute large quantities of food. Food hubs also assume costly liability insurance requirements on behalf of their producers, and provide customers with education and marketing materials

Logistics aside, there's several other aspects that need to come into play to make the Farm to School Network successful. The CDFA considers farm to school programs as: "schools and early care and education programs buying California grown or produced foods from California food producers for school meal programs, educational activities that connect classroom learning with cafeteria meals, and hands-on food education opportunities in school gardens, on farms, in culinary classes, in settings that celebrate traditional foodways and cultivate food sovereignty, and through other experiential learning pathways. Programs may include forest-to-school, river-to-school, and ocean-to-

The education facet is one that seems to be pretty key in making the Farm to School movement work for the long term. Most of the panel agreed that there's not much point in bringing kids all this farm-fresh food if they're not super keen on the idea of eating it. That means food service providers and students alike will need instruction on how to make appetizing, culturally relevant meals, and students will need to be participating in and engaged with where their food is actually coming from, be this a school garden, or a farm within their

Track 1 of the Farm to School grant program could be used to employ a garden educator in schools. During her presentation, Lee explained the need for paid positions like this to be developed saying: "There are a lot of paid garden educators out there and there are a lot of unpaid. The unpaid, there's just not enough steam for them to keep going."

Right now, the possibilities for the grant money seem to be pretty open. Lee says, because of the \$60 million in funding for incubator grants this year, she expects to double or triple the amount of grants that will be going out. She's open to hearing ideas from community members on how to best use this money. She and her coworker, Meerae Park, Producer Engagement Specialist for the North Coast Region, say they'd love to come out and visit farms and are willing to support folks in any way they can.


