Brooktrails OKs transfer of garbage contract

The Brooktrails Community Services District board meeting began with the full board voting unanimous approval of the Consent Calendar Accounts Payable in the amount of \$111,876.42.

Next on the agenda was "Consideration of 2023-11 Resolution Transferring Solid Waste Franchise Services from Solid Wastes of Willits, Inc. (SWOW) to Redwood Waste Solutions, Inc. (a subsidiary of Waste Connections, Inc.) and Extending the Franchise Agreement Term."

General Manager Tamara Alaniz stated that Brooktrails staff had met with the representatives of Solid Wastes of Willits and Redwood Waste Solutions to ask questions and discuss the new franchise agreement. Noting that all was in order with the agreement, she noted that Jerry Ward of SWOW and Bruce McCracken of Redwood Waste Solutions were present to answer any questions from the board. The only change that was requested by Redwood Waste Solutions was for the



City council deals with new ordinances

Willits City Council discussed new and potential city ordinances at their November 8 meeting. They approved one, moved another a step forward, and gave feedback to staff on a third. Two of the new ordinances are required to be added to local Municipal Codes by state laws passed in recent years.

Councilmembers adopted the new Chapter 8.10 "Mandatory Organic Waste Disposal Reduction" 5 to 0, after discussing it in more detail at the October 25 meeting. In 2016, the California Legislature passed SB 1383, which "requires jurisdictions to adopt and enforce an ordinance or another enforceable mechanism requiring organic waste to be diverted from landfills. In accordance with SB 1383, all jurisdictions must have a mandatory organic waste disposal reduction ordinance in place."

SB 1383 aimed to reduce organic waste statewide from its 2014 baseline

Huffman on PG&E plan to remove Eel **River dams**

Washington, D.C. On November 17, U.S. Jared Representative Huffman (CA-02) released statement praising а Pacific Gas and Electric Company's initial draft plan to remove two dams on the Eel River. The plan also sets the stage for negotiating a new diversion from the Eel to the Russian River.

"PG&E's draft surrender application is a major step forward to achieving the Two-Basin Solution I've advocated for years," Rep. Huffman said. "The plan includes full and expedited removal of two dams that harm salmon on the Eel River while allowing for modern fish-friendly а diversion to provide water to Mendocino, Sonoma, and Marin counties. I'll be working to ensure that both elements are completed in a way that best protects communities, tribes, and natural resources in the Eel and Russian river watersheds.

Congressman Huffman has played an active role in this matter, having facilitated initial discussions

CHP to up enforcement on Hwy 162, **Round Valley**

The California Highway Patrol Garberville Area will use grant funding in an effort to reduce the number of traffic crashes that result in injury and loss of life, with aggressive enforcement of DUI, unsafe speed, improper turning, and reckless driving violations in the Round Valley region.

"GREAT" or the "Garberville Round-Valley Enforcement Action Team" grant is a one-year project which ends on September 30, 2024. The grant is designed to help educate and enforce traffic safety laws for drivers and provide additional enforcement on SR-162 and the Round Valley region.

The CHP Garberville Area's crash statistics have shown an increase in the percentage of crashes that occur on SR-162 and the Round Valley region. According to the CHP's Statewide Integrated Traffic Records System, during the three-year period between 2019-2021, there was a significant increase of fatal and injury traffic collisions in the Round Valley region.

DIVISION 7 PLAYOFFS **Wolverines dominate Knights, roll into finals**

Willits' 31-7 victory features plenty of big plays

Willits - It was a big play that beat Kelseyville during its first trip to Willits on October 13, a pattern that repeated itself many times over Friday,


November 17 as the No. 2-seeded Wolverines ended the No. 3 Knights' season with a decisive 31-7 victory in the semifinals of the North Coast Section Division 7 football playoffs at Willits High School.

Willits (9-3) advances to the Division 7 championship game next Friday (November 24) against No. 5 seed to do anything either way." Ferndale (8-4) at Ukiah High School. Kickoff is 7 pm. Ferndale upset No. 1 seed Clear Lake 20-12, also on Friday night, to complete the finals pairing.

Willits used an 80-yard kickoff return to score the winning points in a 20-18 league victory over the Knights a month ago, and four of the Wolverines' five touchdowns in the rematch were either the result of big plays or set up by a big play.

"Big plays got us," said Kelseyville head coach Leo Flores of what he called a "sloppy" performance by the Knights, who were trying to reach the sectional finals for the first time since 1999. Unfortunately, their fifth semifinal-round performance in the last eight years wasn't sharp at all, as the Knights

Kelseyville defensive coordinator Logan Barrick pulled double duty as offensive coordinator as Jeremy Linnell was unable to attend the game because of a family emergency.

"We shot ourselves in the foot too many times," Barrick said.

The Wolverines were led by Varsity Head Coach Brandon Norbury

While a light rain fell at times during the game, there were also plenty of breaks in the weather that both sides tried to take advantage of with their passing games. In fact, Kelseyville's only touchdown, a 15-yard pass from Brock Barrick to Tyler Bryant on a third-and-10 play with 9:46 left in the first quarter, staked the Knights to their one and only lead of the game at 7-6 as Jose Juarez added the extra-point kick that Willits' Christian Ramirez missed after the Wolverines went up 6-0 with less than two minutes gone in the game on a 29-yard pass, also on a thirdand-10 play, from quarterback Kooper Dockins to wide receiver Corey Rockey.

That was the first of the big plays for the Wolverines, but hardly the last. The longest play from scrimmage followed in the second quarter when Dockins and Kolbe Bufardeci hooked up on a 70-yard catch and run that put the Wolverines ahead to stay 12-7 with 2:49 left in the first half and was greatly aided by a missed tackle that made the play possible. Willits just came up short on the two-point conversion run.

Kelseyville pushed the ball into Willits territory on its only two possessions of the second quarter, turning it over on downs the first time when running back Max Hommer was stuffed for no gain on a fourth-and-two play from the Willits 32-yard line. The Knights were on the move in the final seconds of the first half when a Barrick pass was intercepted by Clayton Cooley.

The Knights came out in the second half in a double-tight end eye formation determined to shove the ball down the Wolverines' throats. They picked up two first downs after taking the kickoff, but Willits' swarming defense quickly shut things down, eventually forcing a punt.

Willits wasted no time adding to its lead, a 40-yard pass from Dockins to Bufardeci plus an additional 15-yards for a facemask, moving the ball to the Kelseyville 13. Finn Lessner scored four plays later on a 1-yard run for an 18-7 Wolverines lead.

Willits was on the move again late in the quarter after inheriting great field position following a short Kelseyville punt that rolled out of bounds at the Willits 49. The Wolverines punched the ball out to near midfield with four straight runs before Dockins connected with Lessner on a second-and-17 play early in the fourth quarter. Lessner changed course after coming down with the ball, cutting back to his left toward the Willits sideline where he found a clear path to the end zone. The 46-yard touchdown made it 24-7 only 26 seconds into the final period.

Kelseyville turned the ball over on each of its next two possessions, the second takeaway resulting in the Wolverines' final touchdown, a 1-yard Lessner run with 3:26 remaining.

If Yesenia Cisneros can make her dreams and plans come might consider a makeup line down the road," said Cisneros.

"We carry a lot of Native American prints," explained Cisneros. "I'm Native American so I started to create and sell it at the store. We have a bunch of hats, belts, new and used clothing. Our Pro Club line of clothing is quite popular amongst the youth. They like that the T-shirts are longer and can protect someone's privacy when they bend over. We have to wade through city permits which delayed her opening Shaka brand and a lot of printed T-shirts that have California and caused her to lose a couple of months' income, she is on them. We have nose-piercing jewelry that's pretty popular.'

There are also some interesting items that some may not be familiar with, such as Pop Its, which are similar to Cisneros always uses "we" when referring to the store, as brightly colored bubble wrap but can be continuously popped, providing a therapeutic activity. "A lot of schools use them for kids with learning disabilities," said Cisneros

In addition to being a store owner, Cisneros also is a community activist, providing clothing to the food bank and other altruistic organizations. "Clothing that we are not able to sell will be donated to the food bank and programs for the homeless," said Cisneros. "When the fires were happening, we had bins of clothing that people could take from. I had a guy who came in yesterday who was in a bad situation and marketing to let the people of Willits know she has opened asked for some clothing. I gave him a few items out of my donation bin. If we're not able to sell an item, I'd rather pass it on to people who can use it."

Barrick said the Knights' defense should only be better next season.

"The two rushing touchdowns we allowed tonight were only the fourth and fifth we allowed this season," he said. "Middletown had the other three."

Willits' defense has been downright stingy in this year's playoffs. The Wolverines have allowed only 14 points in their first two games. They limited Kelseyville to 118 yards on the ground and 150 overall. If they beat Ferndale in the Division 7 finals, it will secure their first section title since 1991.

Game Notes: The two teams had to be separated while exchanging handshakes, and a bit extra, following the game, but there were no other incidents. While the Wolverines celebrated their victory near the south end zone, the Kelseyville underclassmen and coaches lined up to congratulate each of their seniors in turn, a Knights tradition.

While Willits will be playing for its first sectional title since 1991 when quarterback Brian Murphy guided the team to a championship - the Wolverines also reached the finals in 1992 (losing to Upper Lake) and in 1993 (losing to Fort Bragg) – Ferndale, a smallschool power with a rich football tradition, is gunning for a 14th NCS crown.

When Willits last won the section title, in 1991, the team the Wolverines beat was Middletown, 22-14. Middletown jumped out to a 14-0 lead before Willits rallied. That was head coach Bill Foltmer's first appearance in a section final for the Mustangs. Fort Bragg's victory over Willits in the 1993 finals was the first of four straight section victories by the Timberwolves under former head coach Jack Moyer.

Lake County Sports will release its All-County football team in the next couple of weeks.





After almost a year of work, the Willits Signage Committee is announcing a new mapping project created to encourage the discovery and increased Margi Gomez Guhde usage of Willits' unique community assets. CAL FIRE offers kitchen safety tips for Thanksgiving

Thanksgiving is an important time of the year for families and friends to come together. Whether you are gathering around the table to indulge in family recipes that have been passed down for generations, or you're creating something new in the kitchen this year, CAL FIRE has some kitchen safety tips to help you prevent accidental kitchen fires.

According to the National Fire Protection Association, the holiday season sees a peak in home cooking fires. Data from 2017 to 2021 highlights unattended cooking as the primary cause of such fires and associated casualties. Each year, cooking fires cause hundreds of deaths, thousands of injuries, and more than \$1 billion in damages. California experienced over 60,600 cooking fires from 2017 to 2022, which equates to over 1,000 cooking fires per month in our state alone in a five-year period. Nearly 5,300 of those fires resulted in injuries, with 571 unfortunately resulting in fatalities.

Frying the turkey instead of baking it for hours has become increasingly popular. "Cooking fires are preventable. Always use your device outdoors, have a fire extinguisher handy, and never use water to put out a grease fire. It's also important to remember when frying your turkey, fry on concrete, not grass, as any sparks on vegetation could cause a fire," advised California State Fire Marshal Daniel Berlant. "Never leave your turkey unattended, regardless of where and how you choose to cook

Following the proper Y & FIRE PROTE safety precautions this holiday will help you and your family and friends enjoy a safe holiday. Cooking safety tips • Always stay in the kitchen while frying, grilling, or broiling food. If you must leave the kitchen

for even a short period, turn off the stove and oven. • Regularly check on food that is simmering, baking, or

roasting; and use a timer to remind yourself that you're cooking.

• Turn pot handles towards the back of the stove. • Keep children 3 feet away from the hot stove, and away

from hot food and hot liquids.

 Never use water to put out a grease fire. Instead, turn the burner off and slide a lid over the flame. Baking soda can also be used to help extinguish a small grease fire. • Make sure a fire extinguisher is in the kitchen and you know how to use it.

• Ensure you have working smoke alarms installed in your home. Press the test button and if the alarm does not beep, replace the unit immediately.

• When using a turkey fryer, be sure to follow instructions closely. Don't exceed the recommended oil level and only use the device outdoors. Never place a frozen or partially thawed turkey in hot oil.

 Know your exit routes in case of a fire emergency, get everyone out and then call 911.

to create a Two-Basin Solution for the project and establishing the Potter Valley Project Ad Hoc Committee in 2018 when they learned that PG&E was surrendering the license. The committee, made up of a wide range of tribes, stakeholders, agencies, local governments, and PG&E, formed the basis for negotiations surrounding dam removal and water supply in the two watersheds.

Additional details of PG&E's plan

The utility must provide a plan to federal regulators as part of the license surrender process triggered by PG&E's decision to divest from the financially inviable project, which has not generated power since 2021. PG&E must submit a final Draft License Surrender Application and Decommissioning Plan to federal regulators in May 2024, and a Final License Surrender Application in January 2025.

PG&E's draft also includes, as an alternative for evaluation, a revised framework proposal from a regional group to negotiate terms for a new diversion facility that could support ongoing limited water diversions into the Russian River watershed after removing the dams, provided such diversions are consistent with the full recovery of the Eel River ecosystem to self-sustaining, harvestable populations.

Potter Valley Project background

The Potter Valley Project includes two Eel River dams, a diversion tunnel that moves water out of the Eel River watershed and into the East Branch of the Russian River, and a powerhouse. The project's owner, PG&E, has allowed its license for the operation to expire and is currently working with federal regulators to develop a license surrender and decommissioning plan for the facilities.

Located on the Eel River 20 miles northeast of Ukiah Scott Dam and Cape Horn Dam are over 100 years old. Equipment failures in 2021 caused project owner PG&E to permanently suspend hydropower operations. Water storage levels in Lake Pillsbury, the reservoir created by Scott Dam, have been reduced by more than 25% due to increased seismic safety concerns with the dam.

Scott Dam completely blocks fish passage to highquality cold-water habitat in the Eel River headwaters. The smaller Cape Horn diversion dam has a faulty fish ladder that needs to be revised to meet current environmental standards

Removing the Eel River dams would make the Eel California's longest free-flowing river and reconnect salmon and steelhead with almost 300 miles of coldwater habitat.

Tribes, conservation and commercial fishing groups have long advocated for a free-flowing Eel River. In 2023, American Rivers named the Eel one of America's Most Endangered Rivers, citing the Potter Valley Project dams as major factors driving Chinook salmon, steelhead, and Pacific lamprey toward extinction.

Congressman Jared Huffman represents California's 2nd Congressional District, which spans the North Coast of the state from the Golden Gate Bridge to the Oregon border, and includes Marin, Sonoma, Mendocino, Humboldt, Trinity, and Del Norte counties. Following a brief discussion the board voted unanimously to approve the resolution transferring the franchise agreement for collection, transportation, disposal and recycling of garbage, refuse and rubbish from SWOW, Inc. to Redwood Waste Solutions, Inc.

Next on the agenda was "Resolution 2023-13 Establishing Solid Waste Rates for Calendar Year 2024." The general manager noted that at the next scheduled meeting of the board, Tuesday, December 12, a public hearing is set to discuss the rate adjustment which will result in an increase of \$1.77 per month for individual customers.

"Resolution 2023-12 regarding Senate Bill 1205 R-2 Inspection Report" was presented by Brooktrails Fire Chief Jon Noyer in a memo which provided the results of the statemandated annual multi-residence inspection program for the calendar year 2023. The memo further stated that the results shall be reported to the fire department's governing body prior to the start of the new fiscal year annually as per SB1205.

For the year 2023, the Brooktrails Fire Department sent out 24 requests for inspection, and 12 have completed the inspection process. The inspection report will be filed with the Office of the State Fire Marshal. The board voted to accept the filing of the report and approve the resolution.

Next was "Consideration of Golf Course Operator Request that the District Purchase New Tables for the Golf Course Business." The Brooktrails Golf Course operator alleged that the district or district staff took tables that were stored in the Brooktrails Community Center.

Michael Rice, a golf course helper, stepped to the podium to address the issue. The golf course operator Marcus Newby was unable to be present. Rice's daughter. Jaclyn Christian Newby, was present but was unable to speak due to being ill with a bronchial condition.

Rice said there were initially seven round tables that were owned by the golf course, and during the COVID 19 pandemic all of the tables were stored in the Brooktrails Community Center. Two tables were recovered, and five are missing. After a short discussion, Director Ed Horrick said: "It doesn't look like any specific individual is at fault here in this situation. I guess the district was acting as custodian of the tables while they were stored here. I think the solution would be to split the cost of the replacement for the tables, approximately \$350."

Brooktrails Counsel Chris Neary provided that "irrespective of fault, there is a premise for district liability. On the other hand, if I was a judge, I would listen to the evidence, and I think that this would be a 50-50 deal."

Prior to a motion, Director Ralph Santos made the suggestion that if the golf course needed to store any items in the future that the items not be stored in the Brooktrails Community Center. All agreed that was a good suggestion.

Director Horrick then made the motion that the district reimburse the golf course operator for the purchase of the new tables not to exceed \$350 or if 50% of the cost is less than \$350, that the district pay that amount.

Finally, the last item on the evening's agenda: "Discussion of Future Water Treatment Plant Improvement Needs, Energy Efficiencies and Funding Alternatives." 



The white broad breasted turkeys were raised at the school's Ag farm again for the first time since the club did it during COVID. The event is also a bit of a homage to times past when Ag teacher Greg Randrup, who passed away in 2015, used to head up a turkey-raising effort each fall, providing birds, and life experiences, to students, family and friends with the processing events.

Processing the birds is a several-step process:

"We put them in a cone upside down, quickly slice the throat, wait until they are 'asleep,' then dip them in hot water," explained Brackett. "We then put them in the poultry tumbler to get most feathers out, and then handpluck the rest of the feathers. We then have to clean the insides out, then put them on ice to rest, and they're ready to go."

Turkeys are being sold for \$60 each, weigh between 16 and 20 pounds, and the club still has a few available for last-minute needs.




Willits Elementary Charter School students enjoy trip to Willits Center for the Arts Submitted by Charlene Bredder, director of WECS Willits Elementary Charter School's kindergarten through fifth-grade students were excited to recently participate in Gary Martin's "Art Talks" at the Willits Center for the Arts.

Mr. Martin talked to students about elements of art and had them identify specific examples. One concept was of 'still life,' being something that does not move, and another was a seascape, involving the ocean.

He had a complex picture of an ocean scene, complete with rocks and fish and trees but all of this was made of salmon for the water, parsley for the trees, and potatoes for rocks. Which is it? Still life, or seascape? Students decided that it could be classified as both.

Once they explored concepts of art, they went downstairs to view the most recent photography exhibition, and to choose their favorite picture. They then drew their favorite picture in monochrome, using only one color, but using different pressures to create different textures and shades and students were able to take their own artwork home.

Students will continue to participate in Art Talks each month, with teach talk each exploring different concepts and principles of art. This will also enable students to explore each exhibit that the center features at that time

SUMMARY OF PROPOSED ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF WILLITS ADDING CHAPTER 17.59 MODEL WATER EFFICIENT LANDSCAPE ORDINANCE, TO TITLE 17 (ZONING) OF THE CITY OF WILLITS MUNICIPAL CODE The City Council of the City of Willits shall convene at the duly noticed council meeting on December 13, 2023 at 6:30 p.m. at the Willits City Hall Council Chambers, 111 E. Commercial Street, Willits, to consider the adoption of a City ordinance adding Chapter 17.59 to the Willits Municipal Code entitled Model Water Efficient Landscape Ordinance. The following summary of the proposed ordinance is published pursuant to California Government Code section 36933, which provides that a city council may publish a summary of a proposed ordinance in a newspaper of general circulation at least five days prior to the city council meeting at which the proposed ordinance shall also be posted in the office of the Willits City Clerk for at least five (5) days prior to the City Council meeting of December 13, 2023.

SUMMARY OF PROPOSED NEW ORDINANCE:

This new chapter has been prompted by recent drought conditions in California, underscoring the need for heightened water conservation. In September 2009, the state enacted the Water Conservation in Landscaping Act of 2006 (AB 1881) requiring all local jurisdictions in California to implement measures to reduce water consumption in landscaping starting January 1, 2010. Governor Brown's Drought Executive Order of April 1, 2015 (EO B-29-15) directed the Department of Water Resources (DWR) to update the State's Model Water Efficient Landscape Ordinance (MWELO) through expedited regulation. The California Water Commission approved the revised MWELO Ordinance on July 15, 2015. As of December 1, 2015, cities and counties were

mandated to either adopt the updated MWELO or establish their own water-efficient landscape ordinance that is at least as effective in conserving water as the MWELO. The City has continuously implemented the MWELO by default but did not expressly adopt it in 2010.

The purpose of this ordinance is to ensure the design, installation, and maintenance of landscapes within the city adhere to the requirements specified in the State of California's Model Water Efficient Landscape Ordinance (MWELO) /s/ Delores Pedersen, City Clerk


