Little Lake fire board hears updates

The November 14 meeting of the board of directors for Little Lake Fire was a relatively short one, with the majority of the staff out on a call. The meeting kicked off on a particularly high note, though. An email was shared thanking Schnitzius, Michelle administrative assistant for Little Lake Fire, for her help on a business matter. The letter of gratitude also included a \$100 donation to the firehouse.

Updates were made regarding the status of the Type 6 engine, 5469, purchased with a grant from the USDA. The Type 6 is still undergoing a few adjustments, but it's in service and being used on calls. The upcoming Assistance for Firefighters grant has been pushed to 2024, which will prolong the anticipated purchase of 22 new SCBAs, or Self Contained Breathing Apparatus.

Training Chief Jeff Donaldson and Fire Marshal Eric Alvarez are both busy with trainings. Donaldson said that essentially he and Alvarez are, "in a constant state of training." Because the weather is changing,

DA asked to recuse from Cubbison case

Suspended Mendocino County Auditor / Treasurer Chamise Cubbison was scheduled to enter a plea at 9 am on Wednesday, November 29 in Mendocino County Superior Court, but the court date was delayed again until December 19.

What did happen Wednesday is that Cubbison's attorney Chris Andrian filed a 100-page requesting declaration the recusal of Mendocino County District Attorney David Eyster.

According to reporter Mike Geniella, who's been covering the story for multiple local news outlets, DA Eyster "is being asked to voluntarily recuse himself from efforts to criminally prosecute the county Auditor/Treasurer or face possible takeover of the case by the California Attorney General's Office."

Eyster filed felony charges Of "misappropriation of public funds" against Cubbison and the county's former Payroll Manager Paula June Kennedy on October 17, stemming from an investigation into an alleged

RV woman dies after vehicle falls 400 feet

The California Highway Patrol has reported that a solo accident earlier this week on State Route 253, the Ukiah-Boonville Road, took the life of a Redwood Valley woman after her vehicle exited the roadway and fell 400 feet down an embankment.

According to the CHP report, "at an unknown time sometime between 3 pm on November 27, 2023 and 2 am on November 28, 2023, a red Honda Civic driven by Erica Gonzalez, 37. of Redwood Valley, was traveling eastbound on State Route 253 just east of 9501 State Route 253 at an unknown rate of speed." CHP described conditions at the time as cold/ dry/ dark.

"As the Honda approached slight а left-hand curve in the roadway," the report continues, "Gonzalez allowed the Honda to exit the roadway and travel off the roadway down a steep grass embankment approximately 400 feet. As the Civic traveled down the embankment, it collided with a tree and a dirt access road and continued in a


Jim Wood won't seek reelection in 2024

SACRAMENTO - Assemblymember Jim Wood (D-Healdsburg) announced earlier in November that he will not seek reelection in 2024, which would have been for his sixth and final term in the Assembly.

"Deciding not to run for my final term was one of the most difficult decisions I have had to make in many years," said Wood. "I can make a case to continue my work, but I believe now is the right time for me to change my focus."

Wood was elected to the 2nd Assembly District in 2014, representing Del Norte, Humboldt, Mendocino, and Trinity counties, and northern Sonoma County, including the city of Santa Rosa. His final two-year term would have ended in December 2026

The California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection has announced the availability of up to \$120 million for Forest Health and \$50 million for Post-Fire Reforestation and Regeneration projects. Projects will address the risk to California's forests from extreme disturbance events including catastrophic wildfires, drought, and pest mortality.

CAL FIRE is soliciting applications for projects that work to proactively prevent catastrophic wildfires and restore forests to healthy, functioning ecosystems while also sequestering carbon and reducing greenhouse gas emissions. Applications will be accepted from November 13, 2023, and will be due by no later than 3 pm on January 15, 2024.










Brooktrails Fire Department was there, Ridgewood Ranch Fire responded, and [Little Lake Fire Engine 5485] responded. They did a very aggressive attack. The structure still stands and]the fire] did not spread to the neighboring house. There were very minor injuries to one firefighter. "Traffic control was done by local PD and Fish and Game.

It was a real community effort," Donaldson continued. "Without everybody helping us, it's gonna get tough. It really does take a community to save us. Ridgewood Ranch is a great asset to us along, with Brooktrails. We're happy to go and join them too."

Janae and Gary Stephens are visual artists who live and work on a solar and hydro powered homestead southwest of Willits. As Organic Attire, they've worked together to create a line of unique, hand-dyed and hand-printed organic cotton clothing with a nature theme of flora and fauna.

They start with organic cotton fabric, design their clothing with a pattern maker and then work with a company in San Francisco that cuts and sews their garments to their specifications. They then hand-dye each garment and apply their artwork with a combination of block-printing, screen printing and hand-painting, with wonderfully vibrant non-toxic, water-based acrylic inks that produce a print that is soft to the touch and long-lasting.
