Over the course of eight weeks, the ceramics students worked on a mosaic mural with guest artist Elizabeth Raybee. Each student drew a 10 inch by 10 inch design, carved it into clay, and individually picked out small tiles to surround it. Ms. Raybee helped us understand the ancient art of mosaic and the technique of making them. She stood by anyone who needed help understanding how to place tiles or how to create the perfect design.

Our mural was funded by a GASP (Get Arts in the Schools) Grant from the Arts Council of Mendocino County. The class hopes to send the message of peace on

earth, as well as promote being kind to others and taking care of our planet.

Nicole Karkar commented, "Learning how to make a mosaic was a valuable skill and I'm glad that I was heavily involved in the process." Elijah Decent agreed and said, "It was fun putting in the work. The time spent was worth the outcome."

Ms. Bakewell's creative vision is to transform the empty space outside the art studio and media center into a beautiful sculpture / reading garden. The plan includes flowers, a fountain, pathways, arbors and benches – all of which will surround the mural with beauty and life. It will become a welcoming environment that gives students and staff a place to relax.

The garden idea started years ago when WHS underwent construction and the old woodshop became the new media center. Then last September 2017 on International Day of Peace, the Rotary Club of Willits gifted WHS with a peace pole.

The monument is inscribed with the words "May Peace Prevail on Earth" in eight different languages including English, Spanish, Pomo, Hebrew, Russian, Swahili, Arabic and Japanese. The gift and the GASP Grant reignited the project.

"The mosaic makes the school look a little nicer," said Senior Bailey Schmid, and Kolby Johnson stated, "I learned the value of teamwork and friendship."

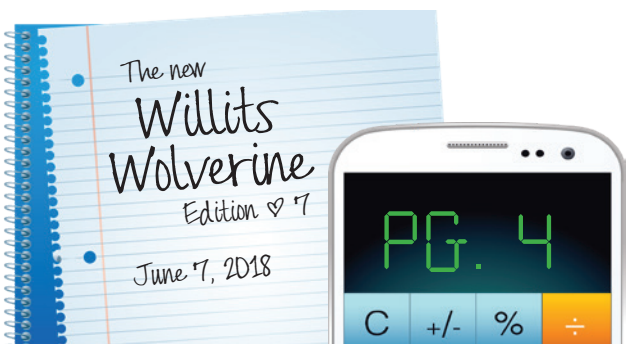

The day started with the wonderful speech, "Why High School News Media Matters," by Maxie Alvarnaz, former editor of the Arcada Pepperbox. She explained that, "Journalism is a social movement, and as journalists we have the choice in what we choose to do with our power."

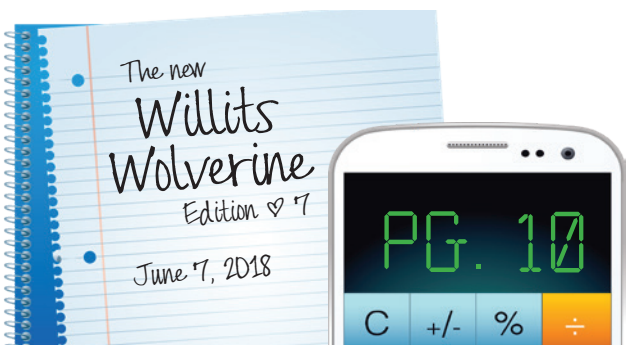

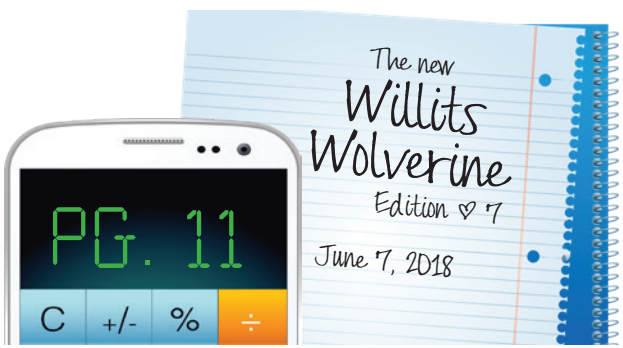
