So, I drove by and saw that one of the barricades had fallen into the sinkhole, along with a warning cone, and the caution tape was gone. One barricade was still there, but the sinkhole is now all the way right up to the pavement and there's about 6 feet of space where there is just no earth at all.

Council discusses new path for county museum

Like the cliffhanger serial adventures from the early days of television, with our hero on the edge of catastrophe episode after episode, the Mendocino County Museum in Willits has survived repeated threats from the county supervisors to close it down.

"For five years the county has had budget problems, and for five years the museum has been on the chopping block," stated city manager Brian Bender at the January 24 Willits city council meeting. "We can't keep moving forward this way."

This was the lead in to a discussion of a new proposal to restructure the operation of the museum, to help keep it open, vital, and able to operate without rigid county rules administered by five supervisors with vastly different opinions about their museum.

The proposal, which will come before the supervisors at their February 6 meeting, is to create a community-based non-profit foundation to operate the museum, which

The City of Willits announced Wednesday around 4 pm, that "due to this week's storms the Skate Park and Rec Grove Park will be closed for the rest of the week.

"City crews evaluated the areas today," the post continued, "and due to major flooding in both these parks they will be closed for the duration of the week."

"As a reminder," the city also posted, "the city maintains a sandbag station in the parking lot east of the Police Department. City staff will monitor developments throughout the storm to ensure the welfare of the community."

Willits was under a "flood advisory" on Wednesday, that was forecast to decrease to a "flood watch" on Wednesday night. No flood alerts are currently posted for Willits on Thursday or later this week. Forecasts show "possible thunderstorms" and showers for Thursday and Friday.

And you contacted the Air Quality Management District because of the dust. And they didn't even get back to you.

Don't get me wrong. I appreciate that Medstar's ambulances provide a vital service in our community.

But what I have to live with is just not right.

Bottom line is, Medstar Ambulance Company just needs to find a different place to operate out of in Willits besides our normally quiet residential neighborhood.

Grant funding available for seismic retrofits

Seismic retrofit grant funding is available to eligible zip codes in Mendocino County, including Willits, Laytonville and Covelo. Registration for the "Earthquake Brace + Bolt Program" is open until February 21, 2024.

The Earthquake Brace + Bolt Program, jointly administered by the California Earthquake Authority and the California Governor's Office of Emergency Services, offers eligible homeowners grants for up to \$3,000. The grants help offset the cost of seismic retrofits that brace the cripple walls of older homes, when present, and bolt houses to their foundations, making them less vulnerable to earthquake damage.

Income-eligible homeowners may also qualify for available supplemental grants. The amounts vary depending on the region and type of retrofit completed. These supplemental grants, which are available for households with an income of \$87,360 or less, may be able to provide up to 100% of the funds needed to cover a seismic retrofit.

New guidelines for COVID isolation, testing

January 24 – As the COVID-19 pandemic changes. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and the California Department of Public Health have reevaluated the current situation and have released new practical recommendations to keep our community

These do NOT apply to healthcare workers (who continue to be covered by AFL 21-08.9), and employers/employees should continue to comply with Cal-OSHA in workplaces.

While COVID-19 continues to be circulating and can be deadly for some, there is more immunity in our communities from past COVID infections and vaccinations. The currently circulating dominant variants continue to be susceptible to the newest vaccines and treatments. Even with the concurrent Influenza and RSV yearly epidemics, the risk to our communities is under better control.

Therefore, recommendations now focus on prevention (vaccination and hygiene), early treatment, limiting exposure to the most vulnerable due to age and other medical conditions, and basing duration of interventions more on symptoms -- minimizing disruption of most activities in our community.

CDPH has released these recommendations to maximize effectiveness of our interventions:

For prevention:

- Stay up to date with the most current vaccines.
- Stay home if you are sick.
- · Cover your coughs.
- Wash your hands.
- · High risk people should consider wearing a highquality mask in indoor and public places.

• If you have new symptoms test for COVID (and Influenza) and if your test shows you do have COVID or Influenza, get the highly effective treatment.

If you have new Covid symptoms:

- Stay home.
- Test right away.
- · Mask.
- Treat, if needed.

If you test negative, re-test in 1-2 days with a rapid test or a PCR/NAAT test.

If you test positive (even without symptoms) OR your provider has made a clinical diagnosis for SARS

• Stay home until you have not had fever for 24 hours (without fever-reducing medication) and your symptoms are mild and improving.

• Avoid contact with high risk people for ten (10)

• If you are high risk, seek highly effective treatment within five (5) to seven (7) days. If you cannot consult a provider, use the State contractor for free at 1-833-

 Mask when you are around others for ten (10) days after you test is positive OR when symptoms

 You may end this sooner if you have not had fever for 24 hours (without fever- reducing medication), and your symptoms are mild and improving AND after two (2) negative tests one day apart.

It's that time again. Looking forward to April, signups for Willits Redwood Little League are in full swing. Last Saturday, families were invited to come down to the Willits High School gymnasium to register in person, ask questions, enjoy some pizza donated by Slam Dunk, and play some catch outside or basketball inside

"It provides face time for people to come and ask questions," explained Andrew Hosford, president of the Willits Redwood Little League board, "because we have a couple of changes that are going on this year."

The changes Hosford referred to are an attempt to organize and sign up enough girls for a softball league and a newly refurbished field. "We've had a bunch of community members reach out to us each year for the past few years," Hosford continued. "They ask about girls softball, so we're going to give that a try.

"We're hoping to have enough people register for it. If we don't, we'll just continue to have the regular baseball program. We mostly have the little girls starting in T-ball and coach pitch. We have less girls in the minors, even less in the majors, and then we haven't had any in the juniors for a couple years.

"We have two really nice fields that were designed about 10 years ago," said Hosford. "We have another field that traditionally has been designated as a softball field. It's the southernmost field off of Commercial Street. We're redesigning that right now.

"We took off about four inches of dirt and grass and roots. We backfilled it with 240 tons of rock that was donated by Northern Aggregates. There were about nine truckloads. Willits Power donated the equipment to move it all. We did that to give it a good base. We got that done right before the rains started."

The next plan is to add about two to Read the rest of three inches of an infield mix of sand Baseball








"He was in love with wildflowers and native plants," said Mattson. "He decided to start a catalog business, even though he wasn't sure that it could actually work at the beginning. He started selling bulbs through catalogs. He became very successful and began to branch out beyond native plants to various kinds of diverse species."



'Poor Things' The Story (with spoilers): This is a satire featuring

bizarre vivisection, but also human comedy and drama, and social commentary. It's late 19th century London in the era of Scientific Wonders and Mad Scientists.

A dead woman (a

nameless suicide)

is resurrected with

a new brain - the



(Willem Defoe).

brain of an infant placed into her skull by an infamous surgeon, Dr. Godwin "God" Baxter

The nameless suicide is rechristened "Bella Baxter" (Emma Stone). She is physically a mature woman, but also Bella is just a big clumsy baby. Godwin teaches Bella how to walk, to speak, (some) table manners. Also, Bella learns how not to be rude (more or less). She looks around at her brave new world, and she longs to explore its wonders.

And then, and quite by chance, Bella discovers sexual pleasure. Unsurprisingly, her sexual awakening leads to conflict. Several men fall in love with Bella. And men, being men, and perhaps inevitably, their need to own her and control her innocence is corrupted by brutish jealousies. And thus follows a colorful, pitiful chronicle of libertine lusts and overwrought emotional destruction.

My Thoughts: A fantastical satire of male and female interactions, and the psychopathology of control. Lovers walk a high tightrope. How sad and pathetic (asserts brilliant producer/director Yorgos Lanthimos) are those who waste themselves and their lives, clinging jealously to that rope, hanging on and fearful of the fall. Ending my review on that histrionic note, I loved this movie gory and bloody and surprisingly joyful chirpy even.

continued, "I wrote an email to the Department of Transportation since I've been following this situation for about five years. I got a reply from the DOT ... [which] said: "We've applied for grant funding from FEMA [the Federal Emergency Management Agency] for the storm damage repair on Peacock Drive. We are awaiting confirmation from FEMA. Once FEMA has accepted the project, we will have to complete environmental right of way and design to prepare for construction. You can reach out to me for

Cavallari continued, "So, they are awaiting federal funding to pay for the project. I drove by there this evening, and they have put the barricades back up and the caution tape and cones. They are keeping an eye on it, but it is a huge project, and I know that the county budget is struggling. It's apparently going to be a long process.

"It seems to me," she continued, "that maybe they should close that section of the road. It would really only inconvenience just one home at the top of Poppy Place. But, who am I to make that suggestion? But, that's what I would do if I were the boss.

Director Ralph Santos interjected, "It's hard to do work like that with the weather being so rainy."

Brooktrails General Manager Tamara Alaniz responded: "What you're talking about is something that we could agendize for our next meeting and have the board write a letter requesting that that section be closed off to through traffic until the repairs are made. Think of all that we went through all of that time on Mallard Drive. There were a couple houses on Mallard that were slightly inconvenienced for a few years. But, nonetheless, the work had to get done, so a letter from the board could be a good idea."

Cavallari commented: "I think that would be greatly appreciated. It's a main thoroughfare between Sherwood Road for the people that live on Bear and Fox, so I think that would be a really good idea.

Counsel Chris Neary said: "I'm surprised that you the environmental issues, but it's a repair on an existing facility. We would ask the county to implement the design and they could do that even if it's raining. There are also alternatives to FEMA. You could file with OES [Office of Emergency Services] of the State of California."

Director Santos provided an update from the Mendocino County Association of Fire Districts. "To kickstart the flow of 2022-23 monies, the contract template will soon be updated. When it all gets squared away, I will let you know."

General Manager Alaniz reported: "The proposed Evergreen Contract which was a singular template for the different allocations that come through the county to be dispersed is not going to take place. So, for the districts to get the money passed through, we are going to revert back to the older contracts. It looks like the special taxes aren't going to come through until April. We are expecting our assessments this month, and it's January 23rd. We did receive our ad valorem taxes on the last day of December, and perhaps we'll get the assessments on the last day of

"Our Clarifier Two project has come along beautifully," Alaniz continued. "We had the final inspection of the installation so we can get the last 10% of our Integrated Regional Water Management Planning Act Grant; another \$11,000 that will wrap up that disbursement.

"We are also getting our first reimbursement request for the per capita Parks Grant, and our Parcourse replacement fitness equipment is underway in manufacturing, and we are expecting that this spring.

Alaniz also noted, "Rainfall so far this season has measured at 38.1 inches."

The board then voted unanimously to approve the Accounts Payable in the amount of \$19,987.73.

Finally, the board considered the General Liability, Property and Workers Compensation Insurance Provider Options. Some insight regarding the annual premiums and services was shared by the general manager. After some discussion the board voted to change the insurance provider from SDRMA Special District Risk Management Association to JPRIMA Cal Mutuals Joint Powers Risk and Insurance Management Authority.

will still be owned and at least partly financed by the county but would have its own staff, could do its own fundraising (currently prohibited by county regulations), and would have the flexibility to better serve the community.

City Manager Bender suggested that a foundation freed from government restrictions could "make some positive changes, reach out to the community, reach groups that have been underserved."

Bender's take is that the supervisors understand what the museum could be, but may be "out of their comfort hamburgers, and the ever-popular slushies. zone to let the museum work for itself."

Bender, who has attended meetings about the proposed foundation with Councilmember Greta Kanne and supervisors John Haschak and Dan Gjerde, says that the county is not clear on what it wants to do. Bender told the council that a community foundation "appears to be the most promising option, though no specific details have yet been completed.

Supervisor Gjerde reportedly wants the City of Willits to "step up" and be more involved with the museum, though Gjerde did not expand on what he expects. Willits already contributes to the museum and owns the land under the

Councilmember Kanne, a strong advocate for the museum, called Gjerde's request "an uncomfortable conversation, because this is a countywide museum." Kanne said that public museums all across the country are moving out of "the government model" to something similar to the one proposed for the county.

Kanne strongly urged the county to fully fund the museum while they figure out how to transition into a new operational structure.

Supervisor Haschak, who represents Willits, told Willits Weekly that he is fully committed to keeping the museum open. "The museum is a valuable asset to the community and the county, " Haschak said. "We have worked hard received that reply that emphasized the need for over the last year creating a strategic plan for the museum. environmental review. Of course you have to address The museum is a critical part of who we are and brings alive the history of our county.

The County of Mendocino and Mendocino Sheriff on Facebook also issued alerts Tuesday about the forecast winter storm, with preparedness tips and warnings not to drive through flooded areas.

"While it's too early to predict the exact impacts of the storm, National Weather Service meteorologists say the effects are expected to be statewide with localized flooding, snow accumulation at higher elevations and gusty

and clay that will create a compact surface that is still soft enough to play on.

"We're going to put different base patterns in there than the standard Little League field," said Hosford, "so we'll be able to play softball and then we'll also have an intermediate league, which is a 50-70 field. The bases are 70 feet apart and the pitching mound is 50 feet away. That prepares the intermediate kids for the jump from the majors into the juniors. We're just trying to give more opportunities to the Willits kids and more time to develop and raise their skills to be able to play on the big fields as they get older, which will prepare them to be competitive in high school."

The Willits Little League division is striving to be competitive. "Willits is in the district with pretty much all of Mendocino County and Sonoma County, so we're playing some really competitive programs that have very nice fields and don't have to deal with the rain as much. They also start playing earlier, so we're trying to upgrade our program to give the kids up here as much opportunity as they can so when they get into tournament play at the end of the season we perform better," said Hosford.

The Willits Redwood Little League relies on volunteers and they can always use more. They need coaches and assistant coaches for all the different levels. The league also needs umpires. Umpires are sponsored through proceeds from the Snack Shack.

"In order to get paid, you have to go to umpire training," Hosford explained. "We've been continually trying to upgrade our umpiring. We have a number of high schoolers who are umpiring. We provide them a lot of support. We don't have too many issues with parents being too hard on the kids that are umpiring."

Russ Rountree will be running the Snack Shack again this year with delicious offerings, such as pulled-pork sandwiches in addition to regular treats like hot dogs,

"We have some scholarships, where people come in and they want to sign their kid up and they don't have the funds, they can write us a letter stating that they would like a scholarship," said Rountree. "They are sponsored by various companies. The Willits Rotary sponsors some. The local Little League itself, we take care of about five or six of the scholarships. It costs \$120 to sign up a kid, which includes a jersey, hat, and socks for the year. Bats and balls are provided. The kids are required to have their own mitts. We do supply catchers' gear, mitts and pads and mask."

Lindsey Dick, museum curator, added, "He was in business until his death in 1945 and then his child carried on for another 30 years."

Another interesting denizen of the area, Edith Van Allen Murphy, "was a librarian who worked at Berkeley, and she strained her eyes to the point where the doctor told her she could no longer work as a librarian," said Dick. "So, she came up here and homesteaded in Sherwood and became in tune with the natural world around her thanks to the Native Americans who were helping her, a man named Campbell and a 12-year-old boy named Ace, who helped get her started at homesteading.

"She connected with the flowers, and eventually that connection led her to Carl Purdy, with whom she became a collaborator," said Dick. "We obtained her drawings for a book she made for the U.S. government. She noticed all the dead cattle that the government owned that were eating poisonous plants. No one knew at that time how to identify them. She spoke with the government, and they hired her, at the age of 56, to travel all over California, Oregon, Nevada, Wyoming, etc. and to make a book identifying the plants.

"In doing the story of Edith, we found the story of young Ace Houglin, [a local native boy] who was only 12 years old when she met him. At only 12, he was showing Edith how to draw the fibers out of the wildflower irises to make thread. She used his knowledge to help write her book, 'Native Uses of Plants."

Stories about the early botanists of the area led to tales about the natives, who helped identify several unique species and their uses in native and folkloric medicine, among other uses. Blanche Brown, who was profiled in the "Women's History" program at the museum, "is included in this exhibit because she was really the beginning of the wildflower show in Boonville. She influenced the school curriculums about wildflowers," said Mattson.

There are many more recollections and profiles to be found at the Botany in Mendocino County exhibit and fun educational activities for the kids, designed by museum technician Briana Brooks, including a game in which the kids can pretend to work at Purdy's business, identifying the plants and fulfilling orders to be shipped out.

"We're utilizing the exhibit that Dot Brovarney, a local historian, curated a long time ago. The big panels were created for a past exhibit but we decided to do a remake and bring them out again because we have multiple botanists in our collection and lots of other art and ephemera that we thought we could utilize to tell a better county-wide story. We realized that we could use this exhibit to do a lot of programming in the spring," said Mattson.

The Mendocino County Museum is located at 400 East Commercial Street and is open to the public, Tuesday through Saturday, 11 am to 5 pm. A Life Well Lived

An excerpt from "Supercentenarian with Style" by Ree Slocum, published in Willits Weekly, February 10, 2022

Edie Ceccarelli's parents, Agostino and Maria Recagno, emigrated from Italy to Willits and on February 5, 1908, Edith "Edie" became the first child in what turned out to be a family of seven children.

One story about the children's early life that bears repeating was told to this reporter last week by her trustee, Evelyn Persico, wife of Lee Persico, one of Ceccarelli's second cousins:

"Edie used to talk about when they were young and the valley was in agriculture. [Farmers] used to grow potatoes then. Her brothers and sisters would walk out into the fields and dig potatoes for 50 cents a day. They'd bring that money home to their mother. They just felt a lot of pride in helping out with expenses."

Ceccarelli went to grammar school and high school in Willits and graduated in 1927. She found work in a few places around Ukiah and later attended a business college in Eureka. She worked two years in Humboldt County using her business education at a poultry producer then returned to Willits to be with her family and friends, including Brick Keenan, her high school sweetheart.

She worked in Willits for a short time before being employed by the County Recorder's Office in Ukiah. During that time, she stayed with and helped the Eversole family from the Eversole Mortuary, trading her help for room and board. The Eversoles are lifelong friends.

Keenan was in Willits at that time and proposed to the love of his life. They married at the Eversoles' home on November 17, 1933. Soon the couple moved to Santa Rosa when Keenan procured a job at the Press Democrat as a typesetter. They stayed there for 36 years, raising their adopted daughter and making friends, which was easy for Ceccarelli because "she absolutely loved people," Persico said.

Keenan retired in 1971 and the couple moved back to Willits to be with family and friends. Also, Ceccarelli didn't like how big Santa Rosa was getting. In 1984, Keenan passed away, breaking her heart. In 1986, she married Charles Ceccarelli, who died four years later.

Ceccarelli developed a fondness for walking downtown every day, greeting store owners and visiting friends. She was known for "dressing up to the nines" daily, including makeup and jewelry.

The pride and generosity she learned in helping out her family when she and her siblings dug potatoes continued into her later life and extended to her Willits community. "She was a benefactor in a lot of organizations: the hospital foundation, church, Kid's Club, Senior Center, Daily Bread. Lots of them," said Persico, who is now managing Ceccarelli's donations.

Ceccarelli is also known to have helped individuals she befriended in the community with loans or monetary gifts.

Another endearing story was told by Persico and happened when Ceccarelli lived many years on Spruce Street, one of the ways children walked to Brookside School. "The kindergartners and preschoolers walked past Edie's with their moms. Edie would be outside and loved to watch the kids and talk to them. The moms would stop and talk with her, too. She had this little dresser in the back bedroom with a drawer full of things from the dollar store that kids would be drawn to. She'd ask the parents if kids could go in to pick something to take with them. She was a staunch supporter of kids." Many reading this may remember the beautiful and kind older woman who gave them little gifts on their way home from school.

Is there a formula for longevity? A search-engine inquiry will turn up lots of anecdotal information and some scientific research.

Are there any secrets to Ceccarelli's long life? Here are a few quotes and thoughts: "Her [Italian] genes are amazing!" Jill Persico; "Edie was always so healthy and just radiates! She's always been young for her age," Evelyn Persico; she was



As program coordinator, she oversaw Head Start's expansion from six to 13 locations and wrote a curriculum called "Food for Thought" designed to teach preschool children math, science, and literacy through food. The California Department of Education published this curriculum and integrated it into children's education

Working with Head Start was "very fun," Cunningham said. "I was very passionate about helping children by changing their eating habits, and now I do the same thing for cancer patients."

Cunningham worked at Head Start for 25 years and then helped local individuals, organizations, and schools access and prepare local produce through a series of farm to fork and farm to school grants before starting Caring Kitchen.

"April's contribution to providing nourishing foods to young and old across Mendocino County is a beautiful legacy." NCO CEO Patty Bruder said. "Her focus and dedication to teaching others about the healing nature of food will be felt for generations to come."


