Willits woman gets 4 years for arson

Posted by Mendocino County District Attorney

Criminal defendant Amy Joallen Holland, age 35, of Willits, was sentenced afternoon Tuesday in Mendocino County the Superior Court to serve four years in state prison, said defendant having been convicted by plea of the willful and malicious arson of uninhabited structures and grass lands.

As a part of the September 5 sentencing hearing, the court heard testimony and received other evidence from one of the victims relating to the Bart Fire, an arsoninitiated fire that burned

Sen. McGuire to lead state Senate in 2024

On August 28, Senate President Pro Tempore Toni G. Atkins (D-San Diego) announced that the Senate Democratic Caucus convened and determined that Senator Mike McGuire (D-Healdsburg) will be the pro tem designee, with a transition to be announced next year.

Senate Leader Atkins has served as pro tem since 2018, and was the first woman to hold the position and the first person in 150 years to serve as both pro tem and Assembly speaker. "It is a privilege to be the Senate leader," said Atkins. "Now, the time has come to plan for the next leader, and the Senate Democratic

Monday night fire in town stayed small

Mendocino County Sheriff's Office sent out a "situational awareness" Nixle alert Monday night at 11:38 pm about a small near Railroad wildfire Avenue and Barbara Lane in Willits. "No further action needed at this time. Use caution and avoid the area," the alert advised.

As per Watch Duty, the September 4 fire - called the Windsor Fire due to proximity to the Windsor Mill - was reported as a vegetation /debris fire involving a couple engulfed trees, with power lines down. "Willits Police Department on scene. 20x20 spot with moderate rate of spread and power lines involved. Fire personnel still making access."

PG&E was requested to respond for the downed powerlines: "Will not be able to take action until power is off."

As of midnight, Watch Duty reported evacuations had no been issued and no structures were involved or threatened.

Covelo man gets 4 years for felony assault

Defendant Brock Adam Rogers, age 41, of Covelo, was sentenced in the Mendocino County Superior Court on August 25 to four years in state prison. He was remanded from the courtroom into the custody of the Sheriff's Office for transportation to California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation.

Rogers stands convicted by a June 2023 plea of felony assault with a deadly weapon, said felonious assault occurring just days before Thanksgiving 2022.

Rogers, through his private attorney, has repeatedly asserted during court proceedings

State is auditing county financial reporting

Sacramento - On August 31, State Controller Malia Cohen authorized Μ. an audit of Mendocino County after conversations with county officials who expressed concerns as to whether the annual financial reports required to be prepared and delivered to the state are correct and complete.

Controller Cohen acknowledged receipt of the request for an audit from the Mendocino County Board of Supervisors, who voted unanimously to request the State Controller's Office's assistance to resolve what some officials have referred to as a "fiscal crisis" within the county.

"As California's chief fiscal officer, the financial health of all 58 counties is of paramount importance to the overall fiscal well-being of the state," said Controller Cohen. Cohen's action also follows a recent warning issued that the county's rating may be placed under review for possible withdrawal of credit rating

This year, an estimated \$73,000 was netted for the organization, \$65,000 after meeting certain obligations. The money, along with helping to fund the operations of the center, will go to building a new roof for the barn where the hay for the horses is stored. Last winter, much of the hay was lost due to leakage and the new roof will go a long way to negating that problem and reducing operating costs.

verbal. He didn't talk, although he would say one-syllable words on occasion. He said 'hi' to Dan and Muffin who nuzzled him and he was really engaged with each of the horses.


"Towards the end of our visit," said Holzhauer, "we ended up over by Raspberry and Ira. Raspberry is one of our largest equines and she's been an amazing horse for our program. At the gate, the youngster was visiting with the horses and Raspberry was blowing her nose on his hand. He looked at her and he said, 'Do you want out now?' and so it was a group of words that he put together.

"His dad looked at me, stunned and quiet, and he said that it was the very first time that he ever heard the child say a full sentence. That is the impact of a horse," Holzhauer told the crowd.

In the past, the Claws for a Cause fundraisers have bought a half-cover for the arena so the school can operate in heat and rain, an office building used for paperwork and intake, and the purchase of an "equicizer," which simulates the movement of horses for those clients who are not quite ready to interface with the actual animals.

Many volunteers and organizations and sponsors were instrumental in producing this very successful dinner and auction. The Willits Rotary Club, which in the past has been the producing entity, has recently ceded those duties to the





'Equalizer 3'

The Story: A small town on the coast in beautiful Sicily. Mafioso thugs bully and brutalize the locals. They strut around like the punks that they are. They strong-arm shopkeepers. Plant bombs in cars. Only one man can stop them, Denzel Washington! He's manly. He's a grown-up. He's the Equalizer and revenge is guaranteed.

knives. Assault rifles. He doesn't make a lot of noise, or cause a commotion. Bad guys sent off to sleep with the fishes. No big deal. It's quite gratifying.

My Thoughts: Revenge dramas have been pleasing audiences for centuries, and cheesy physical violence is an essential driver of the story. The grosser, the better. "Kill all the bad guys!" It feels good. It sells tickets. And now that I've revealed myself as a cinema psychopath, my only defense is that most folks in the audience have a wee bit of the psycho, too. On the big screen we get satisfying Death Imagery, at the same time knowing: No one is actually dying. And then, we enjoy the quiet and quite holy notion that for a moment or two: Evil has been Banished from The World.

What do we mean when we say "justice"? It means we want all the bad bullying bastards (the "b-b-b's) "to get what they deserve." This is an Equalizer movie. It's motionpicture fast food that feeds our deep-seated hunger for a sense that real justice exists in the world. Though it's only a movie, I believe the visualized violence is nourishing. It's sublimation. It's psychologically useful. Shout out! to director Antoine Fugua. This is a well-made, wellpaced, well-acted, crowd-pleasing

first-rate action flick. Sure, it's brain candy, but not empty calories.

Parents: Too much killing for little ones. It's death made easy. This is for adults who know the difference between what's on screen and real life.

This year's move from the previous location of Paul Dolan's Dark Horse Ranch to Anna Beuselinck and Gary Breen's Campovida in Hopland coincided with another change for 2023: the stewardship transition of Anya Jindrich as the new executive director of the Cancer Resource Centers of Mendocino County.

Jindrich will continue the work of the CRCMC, which has been operating for 28 years. During those years, CRCMC has provided critical cancersupport services, free of charge, to anyone facing cancer in Mendocino County. Central to these services are "Patient Navigators" who play a vital role by assisting clients in preparing for medical appointments, offering emotional support, and attending appointments to audio record and make written summaries.

Additionally, CRCMC provides translation for Spanish-speaking clients, help navigating the complex medical system, a resource lending library, a boutique with wigs, scarves, and prosthesis, support groups, and transportation assistance, among other essential services.

This year's testimonial speaker, Claudia Jimenez, shared her personal journey through cancer. Her firsthand account of CRCMC's steadfast support captured the heart of the organization.
