New Eel-Russian Project **Authority** formed

The Sonoma County Board of Supervisors, who also serve as the Board of Directors for the Sonoma County Water Agency, voted on December 5 to approve a Joint Exercise of Powers Agreement with Mendocino County Inland Water and Power Commission to form the Eel-Russian Project Authority.(This press release from Sonoma County Water Agency was posted this week by the Mendocino County Inland Water Commission.)

The new entity will have the power to negotiate with the Pacific Gas and Electric Company as the utility moves ahead with plans to surrender operations of the Potter Valley Hydroelectric Project and to decommission the Scott and Cape Horn dams on the Eel River. The new authority will also have the legal capacity to own, construct and operate a new water diversion facility



The Department of Social Services put on a Holiday Party for foster kids and families. Staff are dedicated to making lives better for these kids who are in difficult situations. There were smiles all around. Willits residents are working to provide a warming center for those in need when the weather turns cold and nasty. There is the Willits Wild Bunch organizing the Toy Run for kids. The Bud Snider Park was lit up with Christmas trees, and hundreds of people were out and about on a very cold evening to enjoy community spirit. Three volunteer firefighters taking the Firefighters Oath for the Little Lake Fire Department deserve our appreciation.

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

Willits man found guilty of perjury, forgery Posted by Mendocino County DA

December 6 – A Mendocino County jury returned from its 20-minute deliberations a little before noon on Wednesday, December 6 to announce it had found the trial defendant

Defendant Matthew David Foster, age 51, of Willits, was found guilty of having committed perjury, a felony, in his efforts to unlawfully transfer title to a car that did not belong to him.

guilty as charged.

The defendant was also found guilty of submitting a forged document in his effort to unlawfully seize title to the subject vehicle, also a felony.

After the jury was excused, a bifurcated evidentiary hearing was calendared for December 15 for the prosecutor to present evidence showing that the defendant has suffered a prior "Strike" conviction.

If the Strike allegation is found true on December 15, the voter-modified "Three Strikes" law mandates that the defendant receive an enhanced state prison sentence.

The investigating law enforcement agency was the California Highway Patrol.

The prosecutor who presented the People's evidence to the jury was Deputy District Attorney Jamie Pearl.

Laytonville man found guilty of DUI

December 6 - A Mendocino County iury returned from its deliberations a little before noon on Wednesday, December 6 to announce it had found the trial defendant guilty.

Defendant Matthew Joel Burton, age 28, of Laytonville, was found guilty of driving a motor vehicle on September 6, 2023 while under the influence of alcohol, said DUI resulting in a vehicle crash on Branscomb Road.

The jury was unable to unanimously decide the question of whether the defendant drove his motor vehicle with a blood alcohol of .08 or greater.

While the defendant could have been convicted on both misdemeanor counts, the law only allows the court to sentence the defendant on one, so the prosecutor dismissed the second "hung" count as surplusage.

The investigating law enforcement agencies were the California Highway Patrol and the California Department of Justice forensic laboratory.

The prosecutor who presented the People's evidence to the jury was Deputy District Attorney Chandra Cafferty.

Mendocino County Superior Court Judge Patrick Pekin presided over the three-day trial.

Members of WEB consist of sixth- and eighth-grade students collaborating in a mentor/mentee partnership. Teachers oversee the program and help structure and coordinate its activities. To be a WEB member, seventhgraders transitioning into the eighth grade go through an application process. Most seventh-graders apply, and

There are behavioral standards WEB members commit to when they join the group. Eighth-grader and WEB leader Frida Friend said, "You don't have to have good grades, but you have to be a good role model ... three demerits can get you kicked out [of the group.]"

WEB, as an enrichment program, was designed to foster leadership and communication skills in the eighth-graders, who act as coaches for the sixth-graders. The passage from fifth grade to sixth grade can be a big adjustment: New teachers, a new school, and new rules, so the eighthgraders serve as guides, helping to make the process a little less stressful and more welcoming.

One of the ways the WEB members do this is through weekly activities with the sixth-graders. Eliseo Nunez Lopez, another eighth-grade WEB leader, described what a normal activity for the younger kids looks like, saying, for example, "We teach them about creativity and how not to spread rumors." In this instance, WEB leaders offered the sixth-graders alternative behaviors if they found themselves hearing gossip.

Nunez Lopez said: "One choice is to not talk at all. Just plead the fifth." Basically, choose silence, a choice not all kids realize they have when it comes to rumors. By playing the telephone game, the eighth-graders were able to show the sixth-graders how, in just a short amount of time, a rumor can be created and how little it can have to do with

to a teacher or to the office. Leader Friend said, when it comes to sharing the concerns of the sixth-graders with BGMS faculty, "It's good that we're in a position like this, which is more of a position of power ... our voices are more

The eighth-grade WEB leaders are also approaching

Leader Nunez Lopez said the WEB program has helped him to be more open. He said: "I feel like I've grown out of my shell. I was usually a guiet person who didn't really talk to anyone, and since I'm a WEB leader now, I feel like I know a lot of people more, and I talk to more people."

He said he's hoping his involvement as WEB leader helps the sixth-graders understand, "When something doesn't go your way, you can always be flexible, and kind of move around it, and still get to your goal." A critical skill

The WEB group has lots more planned for the future. Most immediately, they're doing a jacket drive for the winter so folks in the community have easier access to warm, protective clothing. A community cleanup is also on the horizon. Sanbeck says her long-term goal is to get the WEB kids out in the community doing more and more acts

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every other Tuesday as a way to socialize and casually get to know each other.

By creating friendships between the two grades that, without the WEB program, might not have developed, teacher Sanbeck said: "The sixth-graders feel comfortable going to [the WEB leaders] with their problems. If there's bullying or they're having drama, they go to their WEB

The WEB leader's protocol is to then report the issue

their own set of new challenges. Next year they'll be in high school. They themselves will be starting over in a brand-new environment with new expectations, but there are crucial and essential skills they're developing now, as members of WEB, to help prepare them for their transition.



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



saw his mother in the crowd. "This is truly a special occasion," said Pederson, speaking to the group. "We get to celebrate multiple young people earning their Eagle Scout. 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

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customers from her home kitchen.

"For me, it was always chocolate on chocolate!" laughed Cobbs as she put the finishing frosting swirls on top of a blue-andpink celebration cake she was making in her warm and welcoming kitchen. "Having a special cake made for me was always a wonderful thing. I remember my aunt made me a 'Beauty and the Beast' cake, a Winnie the Pooh cake, a hamburger cake - but it was always chocolate ... well, sometimes they had some raspberry filling, too."

While Cobbs says that chocolate is still a big seller with the cakes she's now making, there are also other flavors she's offering, including lemon, peanut butter, red velvet, chocolate marble, confetti and many more.

"I am also offering many dairy-free and gluten-free cakes," explained Cobbs. "I have experimented a lot and have found some great recipes – and I'm selling a lot of them. I have also found that a lot of people enjoy sponge cakes, as opposed to butter cakes which can be so sweet, rich and dense. The sponge cakes are mostly egg-based and stay light and fluffy. I am also using a lot of Swiss meringue frosting, which again, isn't as sweet. A lot of people who proclaim they're not 'cake people' really seem to enjoy my cakes as they are not nearly as sweet as what people are sometimes used to."

Those interested in ordering a cake can do so in one of three sizes: 6 inch, which feeds 10 to 12 people: 8 inch. which feeds about 25 people; or 10 inch, which feeds about 35 people. Cakes are available in single, or multiple tiers, and customers can select their cake flavor, filling, frosting and decoration themselves from Cobbs' available flavors. They can also choose from the menu of specialty crafted combinations, too, including a tiramisu cake: a vanilla sponge cake, brushed with espresso, layered with mascarpone whipped cream, cocoa powder and then topped with vanilla buttercream.

Some of the other crafted combinations include Maraschino Cherry Chip, Matcha Passion Fruit, Lemon Blueberry, and Pina Colada. Cobbs likes to use frosting, decorating drips, ganache and other decorations atop, but always likes to keep things edible, using fruit, hand-sculpted marzipan, fondant and chocolate to complete the cake's décor.

"I do also offer cupcakes, and occasionally cookies and specialty items, too," said Cobbs.

"I recently made some gingerbread cookies for the Willits Rotary Golf Tournament. I have made wedding cakes, and also my first gender-reveal cake! I was so nervous to make sure that there weren't any crumbs

While Cobbs is occasionally able to accommodate shorter time-frame orders. she notes that she prefers a two-week lead time when possible. A 30 percent deposit is required at the time of order, with the final payment due at pickup. Cobbs is happy to deliver cakes free of charge to in-town locations, she can also meet up with those who live farther out at an easy downtown business or location for pickups

When she's not at the oven, Cobbs enjoys spending time with her family, camping, hiking and crafting with her husband, Kale, and the two boys, Henry, 7, and Marshal, 5. She also has been participating in "The Greatest Baker" contest online where the winner will receive \$10,000, meet celebrity baker and "Cake Boss" Buddy Valastro, and have their work in Bake from Scratch magazine. The contest is also a benefit for the Andrew McDonough Be Positive Foundation which supports over 1,200 families dealing with childhood cancer. Participants encourage online voting through social media. Each week, candidates are narrowed down until a winner is announced in February. To vote for Cobbs. visit https://greatestbaker.com/2023/

"I'm not used to putting myself out there this way, asking people to vote for me online," said Cobbs. "But it really showed me how many people there are out there, enjoying my cakes and wanting to support me, and

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




"This is another important step in the process to find a truly regional solution to the challenges facing the Eel and Russian River watersheds," said Sonoma County Supervisor and Sonoma Water Director David Rabbitt. "We're grateful to all of the partners who are working diligently to achieve our co-equal goals of continued diversions into the Russian River and improving fisheries in the Eel The Potter Valley Project

currently owned and operated by PG&E, has been diverting water from the Eel River into the Russian River watershed for more than a century, playing a critical role in supplying water for agriculture, nomes, and instream flows to benefit aquatic ecosystems and threatened salmonids in Mendocino and Sonoma counties.

The Potter Valley Project is licensed by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission. In 2019, PG&E announced that it would not proceed with relicensing the project and would instead enter into a license surrender and decommissioning process. PG&E stated that its application would propose to remove Scott and Cape Horn dams and end any operations, including water diversions to the Russian River, unless it received a complete and

credible proposal by July 2023. To meet this deadline, in July, the Mendocino County Inland Water and Power Commission, the Round Valley Indian Tribes and Sonoma Water submitted a proposal to PG&E to preserve water diversions into the Russian River, while also prioritizing upstream and downstream fish migration in the Eel River. The California Department of Fish and Wildlife, County of Humboldt, California Trout, and Trout Unlimited subsequently signed on to a revised proposal in November.

PG&E released an initial draft surrender application on November 17, 2023 which includes several of the measures proposed by the coalition. PG&E is set to release a final draft surrender application in June 2024. The final application is expected to be submitted by January 29, 2025.

The new Eel-Russian facility proposal submitted to PG&E also called for the creation of a regional entity, which this board action will move forward, with the capacity to develop a yet-to-be designed facility that would allow for ongoing water diversions through the Potter Valley Project's tunnel between the Eel River and Russian River, while providing for fish migration to support naturally reproducing and self-sustaining native fish populations.

Eel-Russian Authority's five-member board of directors will initially consist Mendocino County Inland Water and Power Commission, one from Sonoma Water, one from the County of Sonoma, and one from the Round Valley Indian Tribes.

"This is a great opportunity to earn an MSW without taking on much, if any, educational debt. It opens up the path to become a therapist for those who would not otherwise be able to attend university," Grainger

Currently, the nationwide shortage of providers across many sectors of the healthcare industry makes it difficult to provide adequate care, especially in small. rural communities. To combat this, MCHC and other federally qualified health centers support programs and initiatives that lower barriers to entry into healthcare careers, especially when those programs and initiatives help local community members gain the education and skills they need for a meaningful career.

Grainger said, "We know that people who grow up in a specific community are often uniquely qualified to provide culturally competent and holistic care there because of a deep understanding and connection to their home."

Chico State's MSW Behavioral Health program is an accredited program that meets all the requirements for students who wish to pursue becoming licensed upon graduation, and the vast majority of the program can be completed from home. Licensed clinical social workers often serve as therapists or primary care counselors in community health centers

The two scholarships for Chico State's MSW program, available only to Northern California residents, are the Behavioral Health Expansion Program, which offers a \$10,000-per-year stipend, and the California Social Worker Education Center's public behavioral health program, which offers a \$25,000-per-year scholarship.

The three-year online MSW program option is considered an extended learning program with a tuition cost of \$499 per unit. In addition to tuition, students pay university fees each semester. On average, a spokesperson for the Chico State MSW program estimated per-semester costs to be about \$8,500. So, with the financial support of these programs, a student could have enough money to pay for books, tuition, and travel.

Anderson said, "In essence, the cost to the MSW student would mostly be the time they dedicate to earning their degree.

The Behavioral Health Expansion Program seeks to expand licensed clinical social workers in Northern California. The program includes no obligation to repay the annual \$10,000 stipend. It also offers ongoing peer mentorship and trainings to MSW students seeking to work with children, youth under 25, or families in historically underserved communities in the "Northern California Service Region," specifically, the region encompassing Mendocino, Lake, Colusa, Sutter, Yuba, and Nevada counties and all counties north of them.

Participating in the expansion program entails no post-graduation service obligation, but does require students in the program to serve their field placement training with an organization that provides behavioral health services in the service region and asks for a commitment to provide behavioral health services in that region after their graduation.

The California Social Worker Education Center's public behavioral health program is based out of the University California, Berkeley, and is focused on the retention and development of MSW graduates in publicly funded behavioral health programs. Chico State MSW scholarship recipients must serve one year at a public behavioral health agency for every vear the scholarship is awarded.

Students who participate in the program will spend their practicum placement in a community-based behavioral health setting, and their field training will focus on providing publicly funded behavioral health services. MCHC and other FQHCs satisfy the requirements for service during the MSW program at Chico State and the required post-graduate service.

In California, to become a licensed clinical social worker, you must complete 3,000 hours of supervised clinical practice after graduate school. Federally qualified health centers often work with those who have completed their graduate coursework and passed the licensing exam to provide them with the experience they need to complete their training.

If you are interested in pursuing a career in healthcare but are not ready to get a Master's in Social Work, there are other avenues available to you. The Mendocino County Office of Education (mcoe.us) offers entry programs into the medical and dental fields, and Mendocino College (mendocino. edu) has a well-regarded nursing program. There is also a program sponsored by the California Medicine Scholars Program (avenuem.ucdavis.edu) to create a pipeline for students in community college who plan to transfer to a four-year institution to eventually pursue medical school.

of two representatives from the MCHC Health Centers includes Hillside Health Center and Dora Street Health Center in Ukiah, Little Lake Health Center in Willits, and Lakeview Health Center in Lakeport. It is a community-based and patient-directed organization that provides comprehensive primary healthcare services as well as supportive services such as education and translation that promote access to healthcare.
